ducation Scotland and the Scottish Government visited Stow Primary School to hear about their Learning for Sustainability (LfS) journey ahead of a national action plan. As the Scottish Government's action plan on Learning for Sustainability goes to the Cabinet Secretary, officials from Education STOW PRIMARL Scotland and the Government came to Stow to see how the scheme could be rolled out across the country.



The expectation is that all Scottish schools will practice LfS in line with Stow, who are seen as trailblazers in this area. Children and staff were given the opportunity to share how LfS has become a part of the culture and ethos of the school.

Stow school chosen as a pilot for 'Forestopia'

Stow Primary School has been chosen as one of seven primary schools to take part in a project aimed at schools across Scotland.

Forestopia is a collaboration



between Education Scotland, Daydream Believers and Creative Scotland.

The initiative will incorporate partnership working, pupil voice, collaboration, Rights of the Child, The Global Goals, skills for work and life and allow children to be creative and apply skills and imagination within a relevant context.

Despite the sadness which sparked the event, there was a wonderful atmosphere in the packed station house, a deep sense of one community reaching out to another. The door never closed, with a constant flow of eager and kind supporters. Many were lucky enough to sample some traditional Turkish fare prepared by Serpil. The Baklava sold out in less than an hour!

Serpil and her friends are enormously grateful to all who contributed in any way to making the morning such a success. 

Since the closing of the Green in September, the club has been very busy with social events, our Christmas Party in Dec was a great success with a three-course meal, secret Santa and music.



Stow Community Car Share Scheme – Interested?

Stow resident Courtenay Young, and Andy Maybury, Chair of the Teviot Electric Car Club, came to the Stow Community Council on Monday, 5th December, to see if there was any interest in starting up a Community Car Share Scheme in the village.

Andy shared some of his experience of the Community Car scheme in Hawick, which is a fully-mutual co-operative society. They have 2 electric cars, a BMW i3 and a Nissan Leaf. The scheme is enabled by hiyacar (www.hiyacar.co.uk), which promotes car sharing nationwide and is also now starting up local car clubs with vehicles owned by the organisation.

Benefits of Community Car Clubs / Car Sharing

- They can save you a lot of money: (petrol, maintenance, taxes, registration, insurance, etc. are all included in the pay-as-you-drive cost).
- They provide access to self-service, payas-you-drive, low-carbon vehicles.
- Community Car Clubs or Car Sharing schemes are a practical alternative for those on a budget who don't necessarily need a full-time vehicle.
- They can reduce pollution/ car emissions.
- Car sharing can give you company on your journey.
- These schemes can reduce local congestion and take cars off the road.
- It can save you time. * It can be safer.
 * You can make new friends.
- They can reduce the use of limited fossil fuels.
- They are run by the community for the community.
- You can use a car without having to own one.
- You may have a choice of vehicles.
- Car sharing allows you to earn money from your privately-owned vehicle when you are not using it.

Essentially, there are three different types of community car share schemes:

- Community Car Clubs where there are community cars dedicated solely to the scheme (like with CoMoUK or Enterprise CarClub);
- 2) Car Share Schemes pay-per-trip, peer-to-peer schemes where local residents allow their cars to be used at times by other local residents under a "car share" scheme with an online support platform that provides contacts, insurance, etc. (see https://help.hiyacar.co.uk/en/articles/3193125-start-your-own-car-sharing-community or https://www.como.org.uk/shared-cars/overview-and-benefits)
- 3) Lift-sharing schemes (also called ridesharing and car-pooling) which is when two or more people agree to share a car and travel together - facilitated by an online-platform (e.g. www.Liftshare. com, BlaBlaCar.co.uk).

These three types of schemes are not mutually exclusive and a community car share could incorporate variations of these to suit the local needs. The main advantage of these initiatives is that car ownership - and the associated costscan be shared- everybody (including the planet) benefits.

We would like to get a small group together in Stow – first of all – to organise a survey of local residents to see whether there is sufficient interest and to discover which options might work.

Galawater Gang Carry the Gene for BBS UK

A team from the Galawater valley has stepped in to help raise money to save an eight year old girl's sight. Bardet Biedl syndrome is a very rare genetic condition which affects only seven children in Scotland. Eight year old Caitlin Wilkie from Angus is one of them.

The syndrome can result in heart and kidney failure, obesity, learning difficulties and sight loss. Research into BBS has begun and gene therapy and human trials will start in 2024.

To support this vital research, a team from the Galawater Valley, is taking part in a walking, running and cycling baton race from John O'Groats to Land's End. The event has been organised by Caitlin's parents Liam and Ashley.

The race is broken into 12 sections starting from John O'Groats on 18 April and finishing at Land's End.

Amanda Runciman from Stow, an old friend of the Wilkies, has pulled the Borders group into action. Together


STOW COMMUNITY COUNCIL - Spring 2022

The Parish of Stow Community Council covers both Stow and Fountainhall. The Community Council is continuing to meet most of the time in Stow Station House, where there is a zoom facility. However, when our meeting is in Fountainhall Village Hall, it is not on zoom.

- The fourth and fifth Paths leaflets produced by the Community Council will be available from Easter at the post office. They are to Killochyett and the Gala Water and to Watherstone.
- In the Summer, the restoration work on the Subscription Bridge by Robin MacMillan for the Community Council will be complete.
- Work will be starting in the spring on the Viewing Platform on the back road to commemorate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.
- The Community Council has supported the schools for various activities.
- All our meetings are open to the public. If a member of the public indicates that they wish to speak, they are asked to raise their hand and wait for permission from the Chair. Anyone who wishes to raise an issue is very welcome at our meetings or else can mention it beforehand with any community councillor.
- The Community Council is asked to respond to some but not all planning applications in the Stow & Fountainhall area. We are aware that our function is to represent the views of the community, which we do to the best of our ability. At times, people have come to our meetings about planning proposals. Recently we had 17 people concerning one proposal and we do listen and take on board what people are saying. It very rarely happens, but, if a community councillor had any interest in a planning proposal, they would not take part in the discussion.
- We allocate microgrants of up to £300 and also have a hardship grant of up to £150 for any residents experiencing great difficulty. The microgrants are decided by the whole community council. The hardship grants are decided in complete confidence and are not discussed at our meetings. Stow Pump Track update

We are delighted to report that the funding is now all in place enabling the pump track project to progress to the construction phase. The total funding target was met in December with an award of £60,000 from SBC's Place Based Investment Fund. Previously we had secured money for the project from the Cycling Facilities Fund (SportScotland/Scottish Cycling) and the local wind farm funds, EDF Longpark Community Fund (Foundation Scotland) and SSE Toddleburn Community Fund. A massive thank you to all of our backers. A tender specification is now being prepared for a design and construction contract. It's hoped the track will be built this year! The Pump Track project is co-ordinated by a sub-group

of the Stow Community Trust, and we are hugely grateful for the support and governance that the organisation provides.

- In December, Jo McBeath coordinated a fabulous local arts and crafts fundraising event at the Station House. A huge thank you to all the artists, crafters and shoppers who attended. It was a great community event but also well attended by many from further afield.
- In preparation for the pump track becoming a reality, we will be collaborating with Stow Cycle Hub and Live Borders to develop a local cycling development plan. 


Stow Baby and Toddlers Group: new hours

proud once again.



Did you know ...?

Cockerel weathervanes on church spires date back to the 9th century AD, echoing Jesus' prophecy to Peter on the day of the Last Supper.

The cost of repairs came to £26,334. An additional £2,994 was spent removing any greenery on the tower and to clear any vegetation in the rhones and gutters.

Running a building of such an age and size does not come lightly; £23,366 was required for dry rot work in 2021 and the extremely cold snap last December brought with it burst pipes in both Stow and Heriot church.

Dy the time Danna, our sparkly efficient post office counter worker, deals with her first customer of the day at 9am, she has already completed a shift. The former actress is the owner and producer of two national horse champions. Last summer, her geldings won the top prizes at the British National Arab Championships in Wales.

"My day begins at five a.m, I'm mucking out, grooming and preparing my horses. I come home, walk the dog, get Connor ready for school, then I start my job at the post office!"

"I've got two pure bred Arabs AV MAMBO and AV NOVEMBER RAIN. We went to the British National Championships in August and both came away as winners in the 'In hand' section. We've had a really successful year with these boys. I've had horses for years, it takes a lot of blood sweat and tears to get to this level with them but it's worth it and I'm thrilled."

So what makes a prize winner? "It's all in the breeding", Danna says "My friend Caroline Reid breeds top pure bred Arabs she sells them all over the world. Seven years ago

she told me she had a lovely gelding which would be a British national champion. I needed another horse like a hole in the head as you can imagine. Down I went to Sussex on a whim and fell in love with him....and so it began. The breeding is crucial with a good mare and a good stallion ... then you've got to put the hard work in. You've got to keep them fit, feed them well, groom them. It's long hours ".

"There's a certain way you have to show an Arab horse. You've got to keep them going over the winter and the winter is all about getting them ready for the summer. Come the summer you take them to a show ring, with the 'in hand' classes you are literally showing them off in a ring. Judges want Arabs to be flamboyant. You have to be able

to run with them because you want them to be able to move and show off ... it's quite an extravagant style."

Danna has been working with Arab horses for as long as she can remember. "My mum was into Arab horses and I started off with part breds when I was little. At the age of 6, I decided I wanted to ride my Mum's purebred. That was it! I got the bug, I've been showing since then."

Danna is a dark horse herselfwith a degree in Performing Arts from Newcastle Performing Arts College. She's worked in film, starring in a Catherine Cookson movie and appearing in the BBC soap opera River City. She has also played a racy role in a drama documentary for the BBC about drugs. While she was acting, she met Chris, a singer and guitarist in the band Flatliner; they got married and now have an eleven year old son Connor; they live in Stow.

For the past seven years, Danna has been a calm, welcoming and capable presence at the post office counter. "I love my job .. It's really nice to be in the hub of the community, meeting everybody. Everyone knows everyone so it's really lovely, people look after each other. It's great and a brilliant place to work. Alison (Runciman) is a super boss "

"It's hard work to keep the horses ... with working and Connor it's full on. On my day off, I'm riding, schooling and training them. It's a lot but it does pay off! That first British national champion I got I was flying solo as my mum had just had a knee operation. The week before he cut his leg I was in tears wondering what was going to happen. Then we got to the British Nationals. The breeder was there to support me he won! You forget all the problems. It was an amazing feeling. All that hard work pays off. I wouldn't do it if I didn't love it . "

So what about Connor, will he follow in the champion's footsteps? "No, he's more into motorbikes, "she laughs.

The championships are held in Wales and Danna will be travelling back down again this year, with 600 entries it's a big deal. " I've got a new horse box with a bit of living space at the back. John from Millbank Garage sponsors us, he does the repairs etc on the vehicle which is really helpful. On the back of two top prizes, the only way you can go Is down, but we would like to think that by putting the hard work in, we can be up there. It depends on so much, the judges like certain types of horse, we shall just have to wait and see. "

The show lasts for four days with the championships on the last day." You never know how they are going to perform so you've just got to go hoping. There were some amazing horses in the championship so it could have been anyone's game. It will be no different this year. It's nail biting stuff but I'm sort of addicted now."

Let's hope Danna, AV Mambo and AV November Rain get the judges' stamp of approval again this year!
